Governor Chris Sununu has authorized the allocation and expenditure of \$35 million from the CARES Act Coronavirus Relief Fund to support families or individuals in need of housing assistance as a result of COVID-19.

Senator Rosenwald Champions Dental Benefits for Medicaid Enrollees; Bill Passes the Senate with Bipartisan Support

The Senate passed HB 250, establishing a dental benefit under the state Medicaid program, in a vote of 19-5. The bill mirrors the language of SB 754 which unanimously passed through the Senate earlier this session. HB 250 next goes to the House of



Representatives for a concurrence vote, which requires a simple majority.
