Food for Children



Every Saturday morning Food For Children hosts an outdoor food ministry in the parking lot of the JFK Coliseum in Manchester, NH. Folks start lining up for a ticket at around 9:00 AM, they start going through the line at 10:00 AM, and it usually finishes up around noon.

Each week we serve 350 - 400 families. But our mission doesn't stop when all the tables and tents are packed up. At the end of the day we usually have leftover

food, so it doesn't go to waste. We have a small group of volunteers who spend the rest of their Saturday delivering the leftovers to six other churches. These churches then distribute the food to other families in need. We also have three other churches who stop by to pick up leftovers for their food pantries.

We all want our children to have full lives. One important component of a full life is having a healthy, romantic/sexual relationship with a partner. If you are a parent, this can be a scary thought because they worry about how their kids will navigate these relationships and if they will be safe from harm or cause harm to others.

So what happens if we don't talk about healthy relationships and sexuality with our kids. They will:

- get information elsewhere, which can be inaccurate or misleading, or they might not get any at all.
- miss the opportunity to hear your values and what you believe.
- · receive negative or fear based messages.
- be at an increased risk for STIs, unplanned pregnancy, and abuse.
- be at an increased risk of feeling lonely.

Boston Children's Museum Morningstar Access for the Rest of 2021



Boston Children's Museum has a special program, **Morningstar Access**, which makes the Museum more accessible to individuals and groups with special or medical needs.

This program, generously supported by Liberty Mutual, provides times for families with special or medical needs to enjoy the Museum when it is not crowded. At these times, there is a limit of 100 guests, allowing children and their families to explore the Museum with less concern about infections and large crowds.

The Museum is a unique environment that emphasizes hands-on engagement using all the senses and exposes children to new objects,

sounds, materials, shapes, and physical activities. There is no need to sit still, no start or end to the experience, and no judging. The mode is self-directed discovery with the child setting the pace.

The pandemic isn't quite going away yet, but we are continuing the Morningstar Access program so that more families can enjoy the Museum with safety in mind.
